FROM THE DIRECTOR

In the fiscal year 2025, the museum extended an exhibition by popular demand, organized a traveling exhibition for the first time in nearly a decade, and reached a major milestone.

The David Owsley Museum of Art (DOMA) began the year with the exhibition *The Art of Elizabeth Catlett from the Collection of Samella Lewis*, which examined the life and art of a woman who is among the most important African American artists of the twentieth century. In October, DOMA hosted Dr. Melanie Herzog, a renowned scholar of African American art and former dean of the School of Arts and Sciences at Edgewood College in Madison, Wis., for a presentation that emphasized radical empathy in Catlett's work. In November, we screened a remarkable film, *Standing Strong: Elizabeth Catlett*, and introduced its director and producer to our local audience. The exhibition and presentations struck such a powerful chord that we decided to extend the exhibition's closing date from late December 2024 to the end of February 2025.

DOMA's Spring exhibition, *People and Places 1873-2000: A Selection of Photographs from DOMA's Collection*, introduced the Ball State community to a local celebrity photographer. The show's guest curator, Indiana-born photographer Ronn Brown, spent more than 20 years in the film and television industry in California before making Muncie his home in 2020. Mr. Brown

reviewed hundreds of photographs in DOMA's collection before selecting a group of works spanning the entire history of photography, including gelatin silver prints, Polaroids, C-prints, inkjets, and digitally manipulated images. The show attracted the attention of colleagues in Elkhart, Ind., who requested to continue the exhibition at the Midwest Museum of American Art over the Summer of 2025.

Throughout the year, DOMA maintained an exciting schedule of programs and events. Mindfulness in the Museum emphasized meditative practices on many Fridays, Kids Make Art enlivened at least one Saturday each semester, and Saturday Spotlight Tours gave DOMA's gallery guides a chance to show off the museum's collection to our community members. DOMA also offered, in conjunction with partners in the School of Music, a Music in the Museum program titled *Vientos y Colores (Winds and Colors)* to honor a visiting artist, Justin Favela, in March 2025. And DOMA offered its signature annual event, Art in Bloom, May 16–18, 2025, attracting its largest turnout of more than 900 visits!

And in July 2025, DOMA successfully reached a milestone by earning reaccreditation from the American Alliance of Museums. Accreditation brings national recognition to a museum for its commitment to excellence, accountability, high professional

standards, and continued institutional improvement. We are proud to be one of only a few dozen accredited museums in Indiana. I am grateful to DOMA's staff and Ball State's administration for supporting the intensive efforts to complete the required comprehensive review of DOMA's collection, policies, facilities, finances, and governance. This achievement was made possible by DOMA's dedicated staff members, to whom I owe a tremendous debt of gratitude.

You can be justifiably proud of your museum's collection and accomplishments. And I am here to remind you that we remain committed to connecting you to the arts at Ball State and in Muncie!

ABOUT THE DAVID OWSLEY MUSEUM OF ART

The David Owsley Museum of Art (DOMA) is an 89-year-old university art museum that houses a world art collection with more than 11,000 objects representing all seven continents. DOMA balances exciting contemporary and historical art exhibitions with engaging displays of the permanent collection in a rich, educational environment that serves Ball State University's campus community and the East Central Indiana region.



MUSEUM ATTENDANCE

The annual in-person museum attendance from July 1, 2024 to June 30, 2025 was **20,389** visitors, which is nearly identical to last year's figure. Attendance received a boost from Art in Bloom (May 16–18, 2025), which garnered more than 900 visits—our highest number yet.

Museum website engagement remained strong in FY2025, with 42.243 views from a total of 12.485 users. Of that, 5,986 were new users, and there was only about a 25 percent bounce rate (In FY 2024, there were 44,343 views from 13,178 total users, of which 7,030 were new users, and a bounce rate of almost 30 percent). Notable here is that there was not much change in the number of views and total users, but a significant decline in bounce rate—the percentage of users who land on a single page and then leave without interacting further. DOMA's more engaged users entered, for the most part, to look at the announcements on the main page (22,335 hits), then clicked to either search DOMA's collection (5,028) or learn more about visiting the museum (2,596), with a smaller number (1,307) spending time on our exhibitions page. About half of our hits came from a Google search, and about 45 percent came directly to the page by typing in the address. This likely refers to research by Ball State students, faculty, and community members familiar with our web address. Finally, more than half (52.9 percent) of our web visitors used mobile devices, and 47 percent used desktop computers.

EDUCATION AND OUTREACH

DOMA fulfills its educational role by engaging a local campus audience, pre-K and K-12 students, and lifelong learners throughout the region. As a measure of impact, the museum hosted preregistered tours guided by staff and volunteers (89), self-guided tours by professors, teachers, and community members (114), and object-viewing sessions for University classes (13), totaling 216 preregistered tours in FY2025. These represented 6,190 visitors in guided, first-hand experiences with art—slightly fewer than last year's 7,017.

Pre-K and K-12 Students: Schoolchildren from across the region arrived in substantial numbers for preregistered tours. These included elementary (910 in 20 groups), middle (491 in 12), and high school students (391 in 19), along with homeschoolers (169 in six). Additional visitors came from Summer programs (357 in 11 groups), community groups (54 in four), and others, such as Westminster Village (46 in four), totaling 2,418 visitors in 76 groups. In all, DOMA served 33 schools and five homeschool organizations from across Indiana.

BALL STATE UNIVERSITY STUDENTS

The majority of the preregistered group visitors consisted of 3.455 Ball State students and faculty members, who arrived in 132 groups representing seven colleges from across the University. This is virtually identical to last year's count of 3.413 and 3.493 in FY2023. This consistency demonstrates the continual reliance on the museum as an educational resource by its core campus constituency. To that, we should add the visitors from other regional universities (317 in eight groups from Indiana Wesleyan, Indiana University School of Medicine, Ivy Tech, and Taylor University).

SMART AND THE MCS PARTNERSHIP

In FY2025, the SMART (School Museum Art Readiness Tour) program, a partnership with Muncie Community Schools (MCS), provided curriculumbased tours for 372 fifth-grade students from all six Muncie elementary schools. The students' visit to the museum (including engagement with chaperones and docents, guided looking sessions, lunch, and a free bag with branded art supplies) was later followed by an art-making activity in the classroom. The continuation of DOMA's SMART program is made possible by generous support pledged by Bea and Lynn Sousa, and is enriched by active participation and partnership with the MCS visual arts teachers.

Six schools:

- East Washington Academy
 Grissom Elementary

 West View Elementary
- Each school had 1–2 field trip days, depending on the number of students.
- There were nine field trip days, with two groups visiting DOMA each day.
- Students also had an opportunity to visit either the Planetarium or the Environmental Education Center while on campus.

DOMA provided transportation and lunches for students, teachers, and other adult chaperones.

In addition to its utility as an educational tool for Ball State students and faculty, DOMA is a community resource and a point of pride for the city and region.

- Open five days a week throughout the year; Tuesday–Friday, 9 a.m.–4:30 p.m.; Saturday, 1:30–4:30 p.m. (closed for university holidays)
- Free entrance (paid parking on weekdays; free parking available on weekends)
- Two to four public exhibitions annually




FINANCIAL SNAPSHOT

Thanks to the museum's benefactors, friends, alliance groups, and day-to-day visitors, the museum saw an upward swing in financial support demonstrating a trend returning to pre-2020 levels. One Ball State Day 2025 was the most successful showing for DOMA yet, generating nearly \$20K from more than 50 participants who contributed amounts from \$5 to \$7,500 for this special one-day giving challenge.


In addition, FY 2025 was the first year to see the impact of the David T. Owsley Fund, created in 2024. After initial fees by the Ball State University Foundation, which manages all DOMA endowment funds, the Owsley fund generated more than \$100,000 in spendable earnings earmarked to support the museum's collection, exhibitions, publicity, scholarships, and curatorial assistantships. In FY 2026 and beyond, this amount is expected to grow and visibly demonstrate the intention of the museum's main benefactor—for DOMA to remain a vital gift to our community in perpetuity.




