As you just heard, our University's plan for the redevelopment of The Village includes the design and construction of a new performing arts center. I am very excited for the potential of this new facility to help fuel the continued growth of our outstanding Department of Theatre and Dance. This national-caliber program has grown substantially in the past two decades. This growth is a reflection of the dedicated commitment of our faculty and staff and the extraordinary talent of our students and our graduates.

During Spring break, I had the good fortune to spend several days in New York City, where I was able to watch our musical theatre students audition for casting directors and agents as part of the department's annual New York Showcase.
